GLHA Summer Afternoon 2023 – Sunday 2nd July Blockley – A Village in the North Cotswolds

We look forward to welcoming you to Blockley, in the North Cotswolds. In recent years our village has been recognised as a holiday venue, for its walking opportunities and as the 'home' of the BBC's Father Brown - but there is so much more to Blockley as you will see. We hope to share our special heritage with you. We will gather at St George's Hall in Park Road from 1 pm, allowing time to view displays based on themes developed for recent exhibitions and showcasing key features & characters that played a part in developing the village as we see it today.

You are invited to select one of the following activities to enjoy during the afternoon:

Talk: 'Northwick Park' (Roger Thornburgh, BHS Curator): This illustrated talk will tell the story of the Northwick Estate that has featured strongly in the history of Blockley for a thousand years or so, and the people associated with it, in particular the Rushout family, the principal landowners and 'lords of the manor'.

The talk will take place in the Jubilee Hall in the Heritage Centre (next to St George's Hall).

Walk 1: St Peter & St Paul Church (Jeremy Bourne, President, BHS): There has been a church at Blockley on the present site for at least 1200 years. First constructed as an Anglo-Saxon minster church during the time of Ceowulf or Offa, it was rebuilt by the Normans and complete in 1189 AD. It was considerably altered and extended at various periods. Its history is enlightening, and it derives great interest from its variety of styles. The talk will look at the architecture, the monuments and stained glass, some of which is important, and the history of good and bad people associated with the church!

The total walking distance is approx. ½ mile, with seating within the church.

Walk 2: 'Gone Shopping' (Penny Balhatchet, Trustee BHS): This walk takes visitors past today's village shop & café and along the length of the High Street that ends at Dovedale Wood. Physical evidence such as large or bay windows, traces of old signs or metal fastenings and lettering on walls or windows help to identify Blockley's many 'lost shops'. Along the way, memories recounted from both sides of the counter will allow the visitor to imagine the day-to-day life of a once vibrant, self-sufficient community.

The total length of this walk is approx. 2 miles.

Walk 3: Snugborough Mill (Rupert Williams-Ellis, owner): 12 water mills were recorded in Blockley in the Domesday Book of 1086. Since that time, as many as 16 permanent water mills have been built, many sited along the spring fed Blockley brook. A brief history of these mills will be given, explaining how they were used for a variety of purposes: fulling, corn, silk spinning, industrial and power generation, all playing a vital and integral role in the history of Blockley parish. Today they are private houses, many with delightful waterside gardens. The guided visit to Snugborough Mill will take in its fascinating history, going back to at least 1299, when it was the Bishop of Worcester's private mill associated with the Bishop's Palace in Blockley. The water systems that drove waterwheels and turbines will be viewed and the many phases of rebuilding and restoration of the mill buildings (including the most recent works) will be explained.

The total walking distance is approx. 1 mile, with a steep hill to/from the mill itself.

For those wishing to spend all day locally a cafe and two public houses can be found in Blockley. Chipping Campden and Moreton-in-Marsh are both only around 3 miles away.

You may also be interested to know that as part of a musical weekend in Blockley there will be **two short concerts** in the village church of **Saint Peter & Saint Paul**, **Blockley** on Sunday July 2nd either side of the GLHA event - free to visitors, no booking required (see below for details). **In addition, the church tower will be open to GLHA visitors between 12.00 and 1.00**.

I hope these activities will prove of interest and I personally look forward to welcoming you to Blockley on 2nd July.

Visitors are asked to indicate if this will be required. You are advised to wear appropriate footwear and clothing for the weather conditions on the day.
