### **Collections**

These are some of the most recent accessions taken in at the archives:

**Archives accessions:** We have had some great additions to our collections in the last 3 months.

- Along with the usual tranche of parish and parish council records, we've had some large additions to our diocesan collection too.
- In terms of completely new accessions, we have had three fascinating deposits relating to a lady from Woodchester called Enid Airy. In the post war era, Enid was instrumental in regenerating small towns around Stroud, including Woodchester and Nailsworth, through the Period Cottage Improvement Society (D11978). She also campaigned relentlessly for the preservation and maintenance of the Stroudwater Navigation (D17200). Ultimately her efforts failed, but she would surely be over the moon with the latest news about the restoration of the missing mile!
- If you are interested in long distance running, we now hold the archive for Martin John Daykin, world renowned ultra marathon runner (D17182).
- We have had additional accessions to the Frank Watkins, poet, collection (D16602) and for S J Moreland and Son, Match Manufacturers (D16780).
   Our photographic collections also increased significantly, with the following deposits: Rodborough Court photo album (D17234); Owen Downing photo album (D17235); Boodle rural life photos (D17230); Stewart Blencowe's railway photographs (D17070); Oakley Hall School (D17249).



• Newspapers: The transfer of the Citizen and the Western Daily Press from Gloucester Library has been completed (10 years' worth of holdings), and up to April 2024 has been added to the catalogue. The remaining ones (May 2024 – September 2025) will be catalogued in the next 4 weeks, all being well).

## **Project News**

**Green Pledge Project**: This project has now finished and has been very well received with it being used as a 'best practice' case study by the Heritage Lottery Fund. On site we now have EV chargers on site, the rear carpark is undergoing some 'greening' and plans are in place for a rainwater harvesting system to flush our loos.
